I would try to incorporate the case studies better into the exam, or not assign them. Also, the lectures repeated a lot of what the readings mentioned, so it was repetitive. But then, I was taking the class as a junior, so maybe it works for an intro class. I liked the clarity and organization of the syllabus.
- I think the material is fascinating--the readings helped a lot, but I found that they were just too much with my other class readings. As an intro class, I know the material can sometimes be just a broad overview, which this was, and sometimes it can be a little tedious to study. The discussion section made me feel like I actually understood what was happening in the course material, which was really nice.

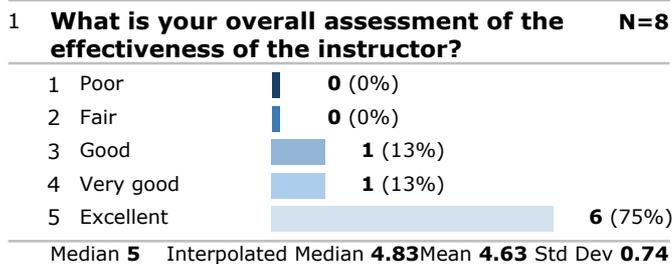

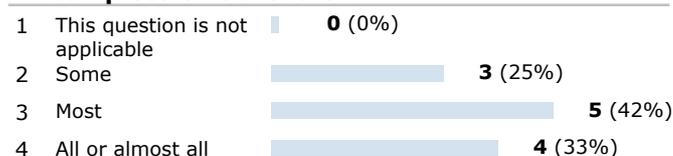

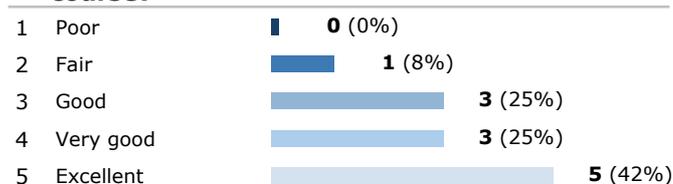
Graph Course Questions

1 What percentage of the work (including reading) assigned for this course did you complete on schedule? N=12



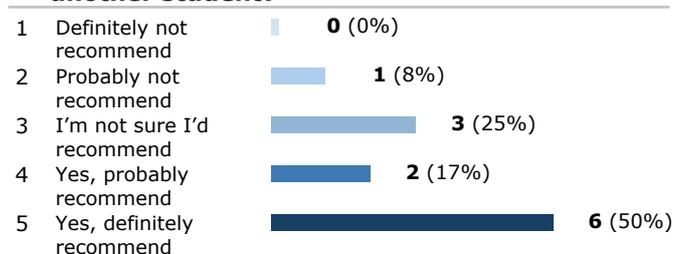

2 What is your overall assessment of the course? N=12



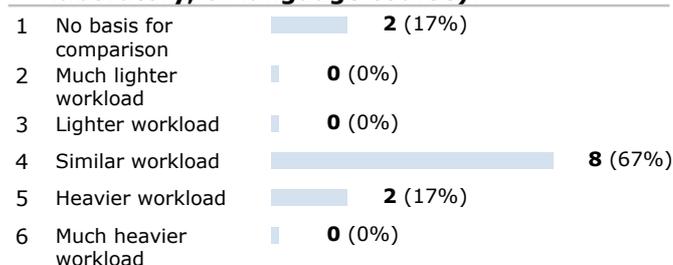

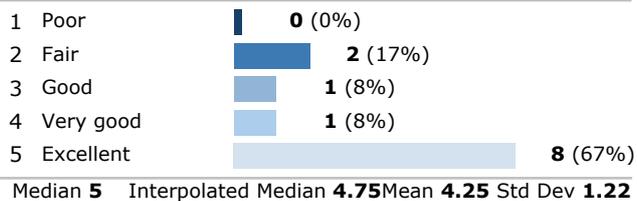
